PUBLICATION RULES

Dear Authors,

Journal *Hadtudomány* (*Hungarian Military Science*) is a peer-reviewed, “A” category periodical of the Hungarian Association of Military Science and the Committee on Military Science of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences published in four printed and one electronic versions (see <http://www.mhht.eu>). The Journal has the papers reviewed by two (if necessary by more) independent peers. The quality assurance system of the Journal meets the internationally accepted general principles. The papers published by the Journal reflect the views, thoughts, and opinions of their authors and not necessarily those of the authors’ employer, organisation, or the Journal’s Editorial Board. The sole difference between the printed and electronic versions of the Journal is the media used, while the qualification of the submitted papers is identical.

1. Basic rules of publication in the Journal

a) *Hadtudomány* (*Hungarian Military Science*) only publishes papers not yet published in any other periodical, thus regarded as first publications, which fact is to be declared by the author(s) (see **Annex 1**).

b) To the review by two independent peers invited by the Editor-in-Chief, specific responses must be given by the author(s) and mistakes, vague wordings, imprecise editing must be eliminated without delay. If this does not happen, the paper in question cannot be published in the Journal. In justified cases, the author(s) may express their disagreement with certain points of the peers’ review, in which case the peers may repeatedly make a statement whether they adhere to their positions. If so, the Editor-in-Chief has the right to decide whether to refuse the manuscript or submit the issue to the Editorial Board, which shall make a decision on the publication or refusal through a simple majority of votes. There is no opportunity to appeal. A similar procedure applies to a case when after a positive and a negative opinion a third peer suggests the publication of the manuscript.

c) In addition to the peer reviews, the Editorial Board examines the authenticity of the papers also with the use of a plagiarism detection program.

d) The Editorial Board reserves the right to decide in which issue and section of the Journal, including its *printed* or *electronic* version, the paper in question should be published.

e) Unpublished papers will not be retained or returned.

g) In the relevant sections of the electronic and printed versions of the Journal English language papers are also published.

h) The Editor-in-Chief may issue a certificate of intended publication only if the two peers' reviews are completed and they unanimously support the publication of the submitted paper. Subsequent alterations to papers submitted by the author(s) to the Editorial Board will only be accepted if those are in line with the peers' comments (clarifications).

The publication dates of each issue, and the deadlines of the submission of papers:

Issue 1	Submission: NLT 01 March	Release: 30 April
Issue 2	Submission: NLT 15 April	Release: 01 July
Issue 3	Submission: NLT 01 July	Release: 01 October
Issue 4	Submission: NLT 01 October	Release: 15 December

In the electronic version of the Journal, the upload of peer-reviewed papers is continuous. The issue is closed on 15 December each year.

2.) Author guidelines

a) Paper text font size: 12-point, Times New Roman; line spacing: 1.2; paragraph 0.8. Footnotes: font size: 10-point, Times New Roman; line spacing: 1; paragraph: 0.

b) Manuscript of the papers and the completed, signed Author's Declaration (**Annex 1**) are to be sent as an e-mail attachment in Word or RTF format, to the e-mail address of our Editorial Office (hadtudomany@gmail.com) and to the Open Journal System (<https://ojs.mtak.hu/index.php/hadtudomany/workflow/submission/5218>).

c) The paper is to include the name, workplace, position, ORCID identifier of the author(s), the title of the article, an abstract with keywords, and a list of reference in which the existing DOI identifiers are to be included. (The use of <https://doi.org/simpleTextQuery> search engine is encouraged, as the entire list of reference can be inserted in it for a search.) Should any of the above listed elements be missing, the Editorial Board cannot accept the manuscript.

d) The total length of a paper should not exceed **40,000 characters**.

e) The content of an abstract of at least 300 characters and maximum 800 characters should include an outline of the scientific problem and presenting the main conclusions of the research.

f) There should not be more than five keywords preferably, and the amount of references should be less than 30 elements. The keywords in alphabetic order should indicate the important elements of the paper and be different from those in the title.

3.) Formal requirements for illustrations

a) If authors wish to illustrate a paper with images (photos, maps, graphs, etc.), those should be in the language of the article. In exceptionally justified cases, maps may be exceptions. Obtaining permissions and managing copyright issues relating to the use of illustrations are the task and responsibility of author(s).

b) Within the text, the source of all illustrations (accessibility on the Internet, download date, etc.) should be indicated. If the illustrations are made by the author(s), it should also be indicated.

c) **Illustrations of papers intended for the printed issue should be in black and white**, as the printed issues of the Journal are printed in black and white.

d) The resolution of the longer side of the illustration integrated into the text should not be less than 1,500 pixels, while the resolution of the longer side of a whole-page illustration with text should be at least 2,500 pixels. **Minimum 300 DPI resolution for photos and reproductions is required.**

e) Copying an illustration from a Word file results in degradation of quality, therefore each figure should also be submitted separately in its original format (jpg, tif).

4.) Mandatory form of bibliographic references (Chicago, author/date style)

In the Journal *Hadtudomány* references are to be positioned in footnotes at the bottom of the page. The format of references is to be in line with the so-called Chicago Manual of Style / Author-Date / In-Text Referencing (17th Edition). For further details see:

In a footnote the second name of author is followed by the date with a comma, then the page number with a full stop. (The word page is not abbreviated in any way.)

E.g. Ács 2009, 28.

a) For a book with one author:

Ács, Tibor 2009. *Katonaként is magyar*. Széchenyi István katonaelete és hadügyi reformeszméi.

Budapest: Zrínyi Kiadó.

b) For a book with two authors:

In footnote: Segalowitz and (or &) Gruber 1977.

In the list of literature referenced:

Segalowitz, Sidney J., and Frederic A. Gruber. 1977. *Language Development and Neurological Theory*. New York, NY: Academic Press.

c) In the case of a book with three or more authors:

In the footnote only the first author is to be mentioned with his/her name followed by the abbreviation et al. If the number of authors exceed ten, the names of the first seven are to be listed followed by et al.

d) For a book chapter:

In footnote:

Perjés 2003.

In reference list:

Perjés, Géza 2003. Gróf Zrínyi Miklós (1620–1664). In *A magyar hadtörténelem évszázadai*, ed. Király, Béla – Veszprémy, László. 109–122. Budapest: Atlanti Kutató és Kiadó Közalapítvány.

e) For a Journal article:

Ács 2009.

In reference list:

Ács Tibor 2009. „Katonai felsőoktatásunk a múlt század második felében. A Zrínyi Miklós Katonai Akadémia története 1961–1969”. *Magyar Tudomány* 170 (11): 1424–1428.

d) For Internet links:

Takács Vivien: 50 kilogrammos mozsárbombát találtak a komáromi vár falában. http://www.honvedelem.hu/cikk/54192_50_kilogrammos_mozsarbomba (Downloaded: 21 Nov 2015)

g) In case of several authors, the name of the first author of the cited work is to be taken into account.

f) The order should be based on their surnames also in the case of foreign authors.

For example:

- Huntington, Samuel P. 1981. *The Soldier and the State*. Harvard University Press, Cambridge, Mass. USA.
- Pongelley, Rupert 1995. “Twice a Citizen.” *International Defense Review* 23. No. 1 (January): 58–65.
